#### Announcements & Committee Reports

Charissa reviewed the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Burbank Singing Star event, which mimics the "American Idol" type of format. Approximately 400 attended the shows and we grossed an estimated \$14,000, with about \$5500 in expenses for a net of around \$8500. She showed videos of both the festival and many of the contestants.





The BHS KeyClubbers gave their report from DCON. Pres. Sarah told of the value of the many workshops, as well as meeting many new people. Lt. Gov. Rebeca thanked Burbank

Noon for our continuing support. Past-Pres. Louise thanked us for allowing her to be a part of our family, especially Dr. Bruce. She reminded us that the newly elected officers are looking for members to serve on their Exec. Boards. Daniil reflected on his years as a President (Jr. year) and Lt. Gov. (Sr. year). He helped one of his Key Clubs add 1100 service hours, while adding a new Key Club in Div. 16.



He, too, gave a 'shout out' to Dr. Bruce. Someone shouted out, "How do you feel?", which is a call to action for Key Clubbers, so we were honored that they shared – a final Ooga-booga!!

Charissa thanked them for supplying 22 members who helped at the 2<sup>nd</sup> BSS.

Bryan introduced Romie Ruiz, who is new to Burbank as of last September. She noted that the Y is independent, as is appropriate so it can remain local and unique. It is the oldest non-profit in Burbank and reminded us that almost everyone has been touched by the Y in some way, whether it be swimming, attending a class or camp. There is 57000 sq. ft. in the main building, with an additional 18,000 sq ft. in the child care center. The programs are planned with a goal of allowing 'everyone to be their best in mind, body and spirit.' 'Learn, Grow and Thrive is a summer program designed around 'closing



the achievement gap. There is tutoring in the morning,, with physical enrichment after lunch. He showed a video with graphs to explain the gap caused by summer vacation lack of educational advantages. It is a program for Title 1 children and is entirely free of charge to the participants. It costs \$1000 per child to pay for the services, so she asked for donations to the program.

The Y also serves seniors with heathly aging programs. They are working with Prov. St. Joe's Med Ctr. They are on their 3<sup>rd</sup> cohort, each with 65-70 participants.

Lasst year, the 'Turkey Trot' boasted 2500 participants, however that will rise to 3500 next year. It is open to all ages and, even pets. It will be held on Nov. 23 this year.

The Y serves 1200 people a year – including sports, summer camps, etc. They have the only warm-water pool in Burbank. They are excited about working with Kiwanis. They showed a video that illustrated how the Y can be a 'new home' to seniors who have lost their support system. Their annual pancake breakfast will be held on May 13 at the Y for \$5.00 each. The annual meeting will be held at 'the Colony Theater' on May 10.

- [Object 1](#) - To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.
- [Object 2](#) - To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- [Object 3](#) - To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business, and professional standards.
- [Object 4](#) - To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive, and serviceable citizenship.
- [Object 5](#) - To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.
- [Object 6](#) - To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and goodwill
