Pres CC presented Patrick Prescott, Community Development Director for the City of Burbank. He began his presentation by noting that there are

150,000 jobs in Burbank, but only housing for 100,000, so our population doubles during the day. Cartoon Network, Nickelodeon, and Disney are expanding ----- AND NBC is coming back!

How does Burbank address the lack of housing? Management is planning for ‘responsible development’ to protect existing neighborhoods from different types of housing, such as mixed use. Downtown and the airport area are naturals for new type neighborhoods.

Many seniors are remaining in their homes, which further diminishes the number of available housing. But, we do not want to be a city with TOO MUCH housing, so they are looking for appropriate areas. And, the traffic level is back to that of 2007, a telling sign that we are good at traffic, but not at housing.

Fred Ramirez, director of planning reported on the new projects for our city. There will be a 13-14 story building on Screenland for apartments with great views. An additional project is planned for Palm & 1<sup>st</sup>, where the developer agreed to a new park and other great amenities that will benefit all



Burbank residents. The Building 6 site will house a progressive-type of office building with some

outdoor work spaces. The Mall is in the process of a \$65M renovation. The old IKEA site will be a fabulous extension of the Mall along with a hotel, and up to 1000 new residences. (There was an open house at the old IKEA for residents to get more information) In answer to questions, long range zoning changes will allow biking from the San Fernando Valley to the Los Angeles River through Burbank. He also explained the new “granny flat’ ordinance that



the state of CA mandated Burbank to follow. Following the presentation of fine china to each of our

presenters, they chose the winning ticket---Yep, it was Hazel!!!

- [Object 5](#) - To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.
