Rebecca reported on the BHS KeyClub events and trainings.



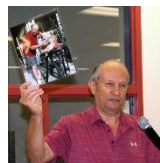
Wally presented Steve \$250.00 for KCAC from the Kiwanitas.

Our own member Steve came to the podium (newly spruced up) to update us about KCAC, which stands for "Kiwanis Cares About Kids." One hundred percent (100 %) of donations go direct to the needy families.

It all began in 1997 when Steve read a story in the Burbank Leader about the tragic death of Sharon Luz, and injured good samaritan Agustin Luz. Sharon's 3 children witnessed the tragic incident! The Luz-McPherson Relief Fund was created.



The club supported Agustin through 4 operations and food for 7 weeks. At that time Steve approached the club members, and asked the Board to support the project. He followed up with letter to friends and local businesses for



financial help, as well as the Burbank Leader. Within a short time, food certificates and monthly checks went to the Luz and McPherson families. That help continued until June 7, 2000, including help to find a family who adopted all 5 of the McPherson kids.

KCAC was approved in February, 2003 by the Board of Directors.

Since that time it has supported Mike Hele and his daughter with more than \$17,000.00, including finding adoptive parents for Allison after her father passed from inoperable cancer. Another single parent cancer victim helped was Dawn Azabo with Jacob. She was supported for 14 months until she recovered. Others helped were a boy who never slept in a bed before we brought one to him, an affordable apartment for a grandmother and 2 grandchildren, and a funeral service for a 16-year-old boy killed in No. Hollywood. Steve mentioned individual members who helped with specific families. Even as he sat at his wife Elaine's bedside at the hospital, Steve responded to a woman in need.

Steve recounted his experience as a young boy coming to America and stated he wants to give back to those who made his life possible.



Lisa thanked Steve, but did not give him a fine china mug – he chose Caesar's 50/50 and he donated it to KCAC. (*Thank you Caesar!!*).

Linda told of a project she is leading in which she is providing turkeys and her source dried up. She passed a bucket – and counted more than enough \$\$\$ to cover her needs. (*Thank you Kiwanians!*)

Other Kiwanis Facts FINES!!

It is the duty of the presiding officer to ‘read’ his/her members. There are many ways to ‘fine’. Let’s face it, some members enjoy the art of mischief just to be fined. It is the interactive ‘game’ of giving a few dollars to the ‘kitty’. It should be part of the ‘fun’ of Kiwanis. However, if it becomes abusive, that is not the ‘fun’ of Kiwanis.

At Burbank Noon a few members enjoy ‘acting up’ just to pay a fine – it is their game – and, it is fun. But, other members choose not to play the game and they should not be made to engage.

Fines are generally self-imposed. Some clubs set aside a time in each meeting when members can boast as they hand \$\$ bills to the ‘Sergeant at Arms’.

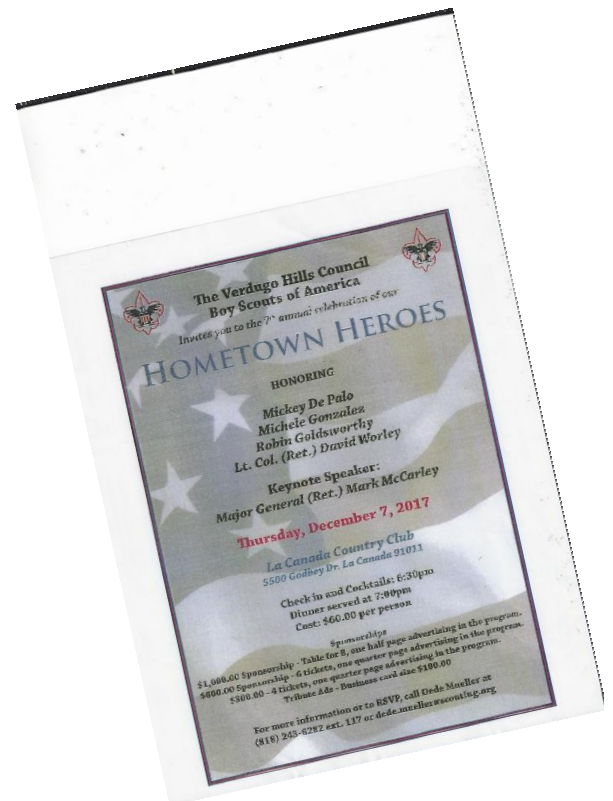
(In Burbank Noon, we do this as ‘happy/sadds – yes, with 2 dd’s).

Q: What happens to the money raised from fines?
Since the money comes from club members and not the public, the club has considerable discretion over how the money may be used. The money is deposited into the club’s ‘Administrative Account’, which may be used in any way the club’s Board of Directors decides is beneficial to the club.

In the end, it is a path for members to help with the administrative expenses that are not covered by dues.

The cost is \$ 50.00 per person Your choice of Beef, Salmon or Vegetarian.

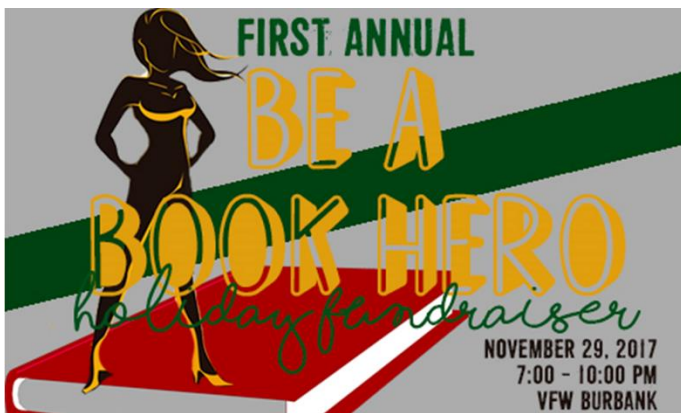

The Objects of Kiwanis

The six permanent Objects of Kiwanis International were approved by Kiwanis club delegates at the 1924 Convention in Denver, Colorado. Through the succeeding decades, they have remained unchanged.

- **Object 1** - To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.
- **Object 2** - To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- **Object 3** - To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business, and professional standards.
- **Object 4** - To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive, and serviceable citizenship.
- **Object 5** - To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.
- **Object 6** - To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and Goodwill
