#### Other Kiwanis Facts Team Dress

Kiwanians often dress in distinctive clothing when they are working together on a project. You will see Kiwanians wearing colorful Kiwanis windbreakers, vests or hat emblazoned with the Kiwanis logo and club name when the group is working together in public on a community service project. Team Dress identifies your club to the community and reminds people that your club is trying to make the community a better place for all to live in.

Your District Governor's Leadership Team may also have its own distinctive team dress. Lt. Governors [who represent the Governor in a local region of ten or so clubs {plus or minus} and District Chairs (who represent the Governor's interests across the District in specific programmatic areas] typically wear 'team dress's while acting in their official capacity. Team dress varies greatly from district to district but it often includes a distinctively colored blazer and perhaps a Kiwanis necktie. Team dress in laid -back Districts like the California – Nevada-Hawaii district may include a gaudy Hawaiian shirt. Other districts may incorporate a pleated tuxedo shirt, bow tie and cummerbund into their team dress.

Team dress is unique to each district and it may be traditional, remaining unchanged from one year to the next. Other districts change their team dress every year. The array of team dress possibilities is especially apparent at the Kiwanis International convention where thousands of Kiwanian from all over the world gather annually.

The six permanent Objects of Kiwanis International were approved by Kiwanis club delegates at the 1924 Convention in Denver, Colorado. Through the succeeding decades, they have remained unchanged.

- [Object 1](#) - To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.
- [Object 2](#) - To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- [Object 3](#) - To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business, and professional standards.
- [Object 4](#) - To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive, and serviceable citizenship.
- [Object 5](#) - To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.
- [Object 6](#) - To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and Goodwill
