Other Kiwanis Facts

Honoring Our Leaders (Con't.)

Leadership, of course, requires greater than usual effort and Kiwanis clubs traditionally honor their leaders with respect and deference. Each year's club leadership team, especially the president, is honored at the beginning and ending of the term of office. It is not unusual to address the president as 'President Lisa' and the president has the privilege of appointing committee persons and setting the club's agenda for the year (although the wise club President usually includes his leadership team, or the general club membership in planning for a new Kiwanis Year.)

It is the same with Division Lt. Governor, who represents the District Governor within the region containing (typically) 10-15 clubs. He or she is accorded the same respect that Kiwanians show the District Governor, if he or she were present. For example, *when acting in his or her official capacity*, the Lt. Governor is typically welcomed into club meetings with standing applause. The general rule is that Kiwanians rise to greet the highest-ranking Kiwanian present (Lt. Gov. and above).

Of course, the honor is accorded the *office* and the dedication required to perform the responsibilities of the office....not the person.

- [Object 2](#) - To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- [Object 3](#) - To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business, and professional standards.
- [Object 4](#) - To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive, and serviceable citizenship.
- [Object 5](#) - To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.
- [Object 6](#) - To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism and Goodwill
